

Sworn deposition of translator Josephine McNee that the translation of the Mexican film "Las Abandonadas" ("Lost Women") provided was correct. The deposition was signed and notarized.;"Las Abandonadas," about a woman forced to work as a prostitute to support her son, won a Silver Ariel in Mexico for the performance of lead actress Dolores del Rio, and was nominated for seven other awards. The examiner recommended that the film be rejected in total for a license to be shown in New York State, due to the determination that it would "tend to corrupt morals.";Analysis of Motion Picture Division explaining why the Mexican film "Las Abandonadas" ("Lost Women") would be denied a license to be screened in New York State, 1946. Namely, the division decried scenes that "condone, glamorize, glorify and publicize the technique of prostitution." The film was deemed "flagrantly indecent"; "immoral"; and "tend[ed] to corrupt morals.";Letter from Motion Picture Division to Clasa-Mohme, Inc., the American distributors of the Mexican film "Las Abandonadas" ("Lost Women"), 1945. The letter explained that after the film had been reviewed, it was determined to be "immoral" and "tends to corrupt morals," and that it was therefore denied a license to be screened in New York State.

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
