The police force was composed of men not likely to be called into service.;A discussion in the Utica report on the raging influenza epidemic plaguing America at the end of World War I. Influenza led to more deaths at the end of the war than there were battlefield fatalities during the war.;Listing of members of the Fatherless Children of France, a society established in 1915 by American women, aimed at aiding French children who were orphaned as a result of the war.;A list detailing the accomplishments of the Daughters of the British Empire in Utica from 1916-1919.;A description of the Daughters of the Empire State and a listing of the leaders of the Polish White Cross.
