William A. Higgs letter, October 18, 1918

Has Been Busy Polting The Huns with shells, Somewhere in France, Oct. 18, 1918. Dear Mother and all:-Have just returned from pelting lead at the Germans and while they don't seem to be bashful about letting us have some now and then, I don't mind it at all. I am getting accustomed to being shot at, but as long as they don't hit me I should worry. At present I am sitting in what you might call a dugout, but I am afraid it is not guite bullet proof-At any rate it keeps out the rain and just now that bothers us more than anything else. I am feelnig fine, only that I have not had on dry clothes for a month, Talk about muddon't know what mud is over there-I am enclosing a Christmas package coupon and you might send over a few sweets in that box if you can I can get everything else I want over here Have you heard how Bob Reesor is? Would like his address to I could drop him a line. Have not seen Ray for some time, but I saw some fellows from his outfit and they said he was O. K. Hoping this will find you all well at home, will close with love to all. Your loving sen, William A. Higgs, Battery A, 65th Artillery, C. A. C. American E. F.
